Use this chart as a lovely way to incentivise children as they catch-up on number and place value activities. There are 100 cards in each teaching tin and tins for each year group.

Getting Started

Individuals or small groups might work through a few cards every day with an adult as a way to close gaps and work through any areas of difficulty or misconceptions.

You might group the cards into 10 sets of 10 and name

them set A, B etc. so that they can be swapped and children can keep track of which ones they have done.

The idea is to put a tick or a sticker for every activity completed. Think of a suitable reward for completing 100! Perhaps 15 minutes of a favourite activity or a special certificate given out in assembly?
